Artistic (Creator) - occupations frequently involve working with forms, designs and patterns. They often require self-expression and the work can be done without following a clear set of rules.



Enterprising (Persuader) – occupations frequently involve starting up and carrying out projects. These occupations can involve leading people and making many decisions. Sometimes they require risk taking and often deal with business.



Investigative (Thinker) – occupations frequently involve working with ideas, and require an extensive amount of thinking. These occupations can involve searching for facts and figuring out problems mentally.

Expertise

- Active Listening Giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- Reading Comprehension Understanding written sentences and paragraphs in work related documents.
- Writing Communicating effectively in writing as appropriate for the needs of the audience.
- Speaking Talking to others to convey information effectively.
- Critical Thinking Using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions or approaches to problems.

Day-to-Day Tasks

- Evaluate leads or tips to develop story ideas.
- Research a story's background information to provide complete and accurate information.
- Arrange interviews with people who can provide information about a story.
- Establish and maintain relationships with individuals who are credible sources of information.
- Report news stories for publication or broadcast, describing the background and details of events.

Work Setting

- Pressured by time / deadlines all the time
- Constant contact with others (face-toface, by telephone, email, or otherwise)

Knowledge

- Language Knowledge of the structure and content of the language the play is in, including the meaning and spelling of words, rules of composition, and grammar.
- Communications and Media Knowledge of media production, communication, and dissemination techniques and methods. This includes alternative ways to inform and entertain via written, oral, and visual media.
- Law and Government Knowledge of laws, legal codes, court procedures, precedents, government regulations, executive orders, agency rules, and the democratic political process.
- Telecommunications Knowledge of transmission, broadcasting, switching, control, and operation of telecommunications systems.
